



HELPING REFUGEES STAY SAFE AND FEEL CONNECTED TO THEIR LOVED ONES.

Phone Credit for Refugees (PC4R) supports asylum seekers and refugees separated from their families by war and conflict. We provide mobile phone top-ups so they can stay in touch with their families, communicate with support agencies and stay safe.

We are a humanitarian response set up by ordinary people – volunteers who give their time freely to make refugees feel safer. It is volunteer led and run, with no full-time employees. The service began modestly with a few friends and volunteers donating money to pay for refugee phone top-ups, but quickly grew as this important need was recognised.

The isolation, fear and adverse psychological health felt by refugees is made worse by the separation from natural support structures family, friends and community, and having no means of keeping in touch with relatives still living in conflict areas. All over Europe and beyond refugees are living in tenuous circumstances - tented camps, on the street, disused railway buildings, overcrowded refugee centres. Many are unaccompanied minors who are at risk of physical and sexual abuse, both on their journeys across Europe and also once they reach Europe. To be able to phone home to check that their families are safe, and let their families know they they are safe is important.

OUR MISSION


To ensure that every refugee or asylum seeker has a way to stay connected with loved ones, and to stay safe through contact with agencies and people that support them.

HOW OUR COMMUNITY HAS GROWN



The service began modestly with a few friends and volunteers donating money to pay for refugee phone topups, but quickly grew as this important need was recognised. We have seen a consistent increase in our membership since we began in February 2016, all which has been achieved through word-of-mouth.

Our group is comprised of both refugees and donors, and as of November 2017 we are close to reaching 65,000 individual members. We are pleased to report that the ratio of refugees to donors has remained steady over the past two years, ensuring we're able to meet our fundraising goals.


Over the last two years, we have raised over £600,000, 95% of which has gone directly to topping up refugees phones.

That's over 30,000 individual top ups.

All over Europe and beyond refugees are living in tenuous circumstances - tented camps, on the street, disused railway buildings, overcrowded refugee centres. Many refugees have made arduous and dangerous journeys across Europe, often using people smugglers, leaving behind the emotional safety provided by their families. Sadly, around a quarter of the top ups we provide are for minors and unaccompanied young people. These young boys and girls are often at risk of physical and sexual abuse, and we are proud to be able to help them stay i touch with their families and

support workers.





We can't do this alone. The refugee crisis shows no signs of improving, and every day there are more people at risk.
